DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Head of the River Church is a two-story clapboard frame meeting house three bays wide and two bays deep. The building is of simple character, without any decorative exterior treatment at all. It rises from a fieldstone foundation and terminates in a simple pitched roof. The main entrance is a central wainscott double door. Twelve over twelve windows light the ground floor and nine over six light the second floor.

The interior is a two story space with a sloped gallery on three sides. The fourth side contains the paneled pulpit, which is reached by a small stair. It is so high that the minister stands looking into the faces of the people in the gallery. The four simple chamfered columns which support the galleries occur at the corners and at the mid point of each side gallery. The gallery balustrade takes the form of a paneled parapet with little embellishment. Four tapered wood columns rise from the gallery to the flat ceiling. The gallery is reached by a pair of simple half pace staircases which occur in opposite corners, flanking the entrance.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Head of the River Church is probably the oldest extant church in Atlantic County. It is also a fine surviving meeting house from the end of the 18th century. In addition, it was an early focus of Methodism in New Jersey.

The first Methodist minister in the area appeared in the winter of 1780. A society was formed to meet at Hunter's Mill near Head of the River settlement at the head of the Tuckahoe River in what was then Gloucester County. Land was given by Daniel Benezet, a large landowner in the area, and the congregation began work on a church building in 1792. However, also that year Benjamin Abbot, a preacher of considerable note, left the circuit of which Head of the River had been a part. After this, interest lagged, and it was not until 1813 that the building was fully complete.

During that time, Francis Asbury, the first Bishop of Methodism in America, preached at the "Tuckahoe Chapel" several times. In 1839, Head of the Church was separated from the Cape May County preaching circuit along with the chapel of Marshallville, Hawkinsville, Williamsburg, Beesley's Point, and Petersburg. They became part of the Atlantic County circuit, with Rev. Joseph Atwood as preacher. Williamsburg (now Tuckahoe - not be be confused with "Tuckahoe Chapel" already referred to) and Head of the River broke off from this group and established regular services of their own with Rev. Edward Hicks in 1867.

From 1906 to 1913 Dr. Walter L. Yerks, a local dentist, acted as preacher. In 1914 \$28 was appropriated for construction of the present out-houses.


After regular services were discontinued, Sunday school continued to be held in the church until 1934. As time passed, Tuckahoe became the main church in the area with Head of the River a subdivision of that mission. Today the church is still used, but only once a year for an all day service.
