# **CEMETERY STUDY FOR YOUTH**

(Suggested activities for classrooms, scouts, church groups and day camps)

In an effort to promote local history and to educate our young people about their communities, cemeteries offer a wealth of information. These ideas are suggested activities that will encourage children to explore cemeteries and hopefully this experience will help to create a respect for burial grounds.

A few common sense rules to remember before you begin:

- Please contact the cemetery owners and ask for permission to do your project. If the cemetery is abandoned you will need to contact the town clerk.
- 2. Select a sunny day and watch out for bees!
- 3. Do not litter.
- 4. Check with the local historian as they sometimes will have additional information that may help you.

#### **PROJECTS**

#### CLEAN UP

A good introduction to community service would be to begin with a helping hand. In late spring or early fall the cemeteries often need to have leaves raked, sticks removed, and a general "sprucing up."

Have the group wear old clothes, work gloves, and bring along a trash bag. Tools such as rakes could be provided by the instructors and parents. A few towns have annual clean up days. To find out if this project needs additional assistance please contact the town historian.

### ART

\*Grave Stone Rubbings



You will need to check with the cemetery owner before beginning this project. Please do not rub headstones made of marble or slate. Due to acid-rain these stones are becoming fragile and the pressure of rubbing may cause damage. Granite stones may be used to make rubbings. Also check the headstones for stability before you begin, as some stones may tip over with the slightest amount of pressure.

### Supplies:

- 1. Large pieces of paper you can purchase the end rolls of newsprint from the local newspaper office. It is usually sold on rolls.
- 2. Soft brush to brush off the stones.
- 3. Masking tape to hold your paper in place.
- 4. Large (fat) wax crayon remove the wrapper so that you can use the edge.

### To Make a Rubbing:

- 1. Carefully brush off the stone to remove any dirt.
- 2. Place your paper so that you have extra to tape to the back of the stone. (You can trim it off later).
- 3. Tape the paper down and make sure it is smooth over the area you wish to rub.
- 4. Start from the top and work down. A gentle even motion works well. Be careful not to rub too hard or the paper may tear.
- 5. It is helpful to demonstrate to the group before you pass out the paper.

#### \* Sketches

Have students collect various examples of designs, shapes, and symbols found on headstones. Also try sketching stones and their surroundings. Motifs found on stones will vary from different time periods. Have the group record the date of the headstones along with the carving designs and compare them.

### INDIVIDUAL SUBJECT AREAS FOR STUDY

#### **ENGLISH**

Record the poetry, sayings, messages or epitaphs from the stones. Choose a few from each decade that are the saddest, amusing and/or most unusual. Notice the spelling of words. Use either a tape recorder or hand copy the information.

#### GEOGRAPHY

Where is the cemetery located in relationship to the community? This will involve studies of old maps and community development patterns. Maps are filed with the County Clerk, Real Property Office and the County Historian.

#### HISTORY

Record information off random stones. Research the names of the people through the records held by the Richmond Library and County Historian. Then check the local newspapers for what was happening in this area at that time. Note historical events such as wars, political activities, and/or natural disasters.

#### MATH

Some stones will have the year a person was born, exact age when they died and the death date. Simple addition and subtraction may be practiced. Statistics using age of death and dates would be another study. For example: "How many people under age 10 died between 1840 and 1890?"

### SCIENCE


Gather information from the stones that gives causes of death. Ask questions such as "Do we have a cure for this today?", "Do you know what


this illness was?", etc.

# SOCIAL STUDIES

Religious aspects of the area are often visible in local cemeteries. Symbolisms of organizations are sometimes carved on to stones. Note: the position of the stones, who has the largest stone, which families have a fence around their plots, soldiers graves, names we no longer use, etc.

Then bells our burial ring.


Oh. God! mysterious are thy ways,

This poem by John H. Yates was written for the family of William S. Lay, age 25 who died August 24, 1869. His obituary published in the Progressive Batavian was typical of someone from a prominent family of this time period. "The death of no young man in our midst could have caused so many serious countenances as his. Born and reared amongst us, his uniform courtesy unaffected politeness toward all, disarmed envy, and none of his youthful companions ever felt toward him other than kindly, and all rejoiced in his possession of well earned laurels. How mysteriously are the shafts of the insatiate archer directed. The aged the infirm, those who have lived out their usefulness are passed by. Death loves a shining mark and against such how often do his most fatal arrows hurtle. He possessed all those soft and genial traits that made him the delight of his friends."


